2017 Year in review

The Miami Rescue Mission Clinic is an independent, non-governmental and not-for-profit organization. We are a free Clinic, with 3 separate clinic facilities, caring for all Indigent, homeless and underserved members of our communities in Miami, Hollywood and Pompano Beach, Florida. All our services are provided at no cost to our underserved clients.

We provide compassionate healthcare improving the lives of the diverse communities we serve. We improve these lives by providing culturally appropriate, non-judgmental, quality, passionate and professional healthcare to our Rescue Mission clients, plus extending this care to our neighboring homeless community and nearby residents. All services, labs, medications, referred specialists and more sophisticated care is arranged and provided at no cost to clients.

The Miami Rescue Mission Clinic saw continued growth in patient visits reaching 11,036, along with an unprecedented expansion of facilities and medical services in a free community clinic.

How the clinics were funded in 2017

In 2017, many individuals, companies, and foundations gave in-kind and cash contributions to MRMC. Businesses and organizations provided products and expertise needed and leveraged for humanitarian purposes. Their generous cash donations helped keep MRMC independent from external interests, maintaining the flexibility of its work.

MRMC received a record preaudit \$2,086,636 in total support in 2017, including \$1,572,535 in-kind (volunteer providers, medicines, medical supplies, and medical equipment donations) and \$514,101 in cash support.

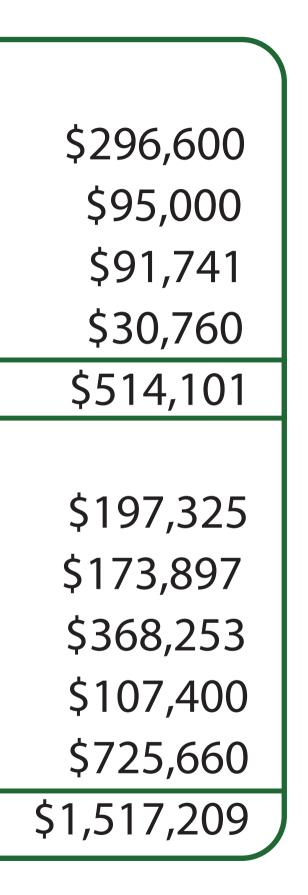

Clinical services provided in 2017

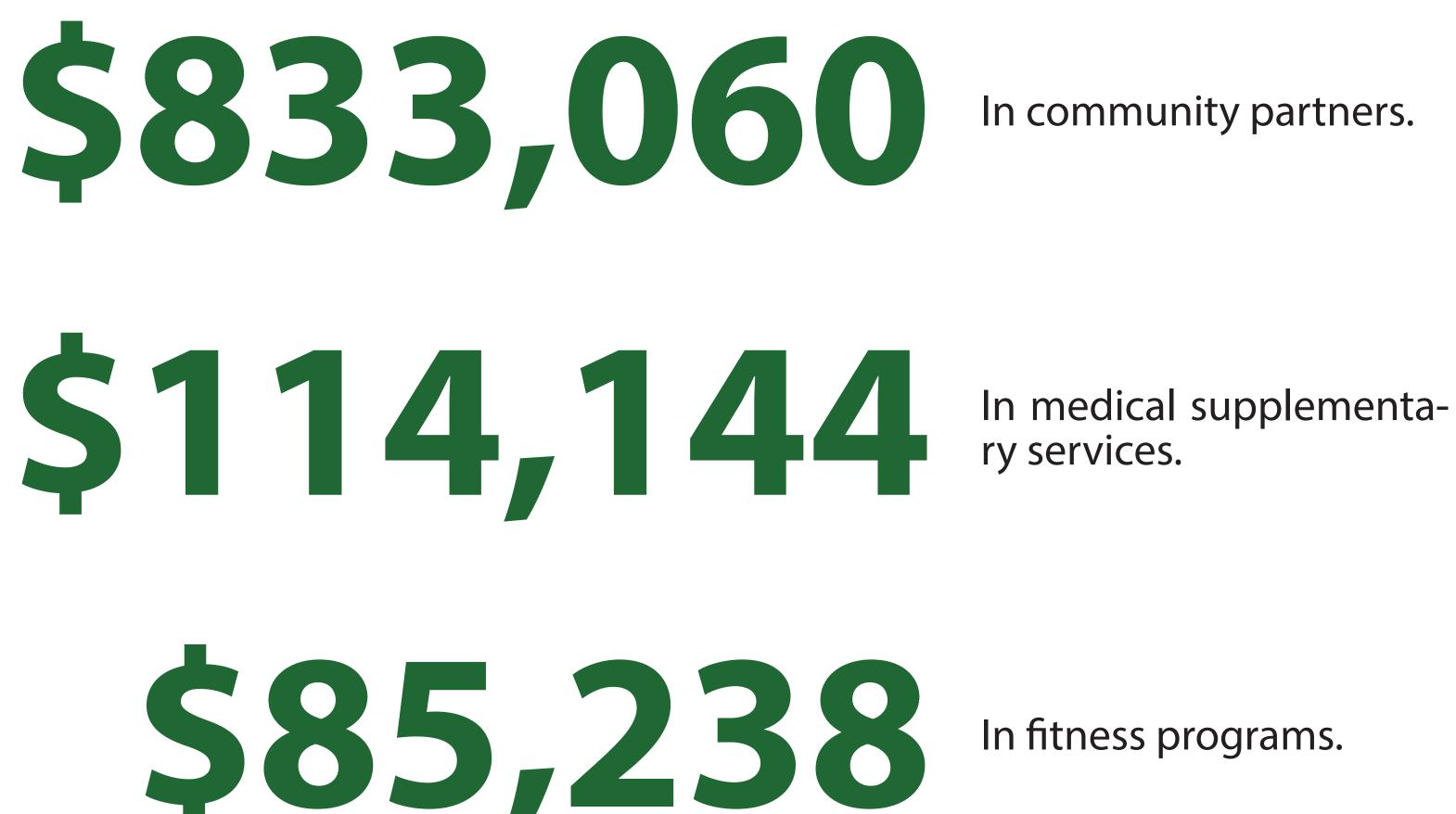
The Miami Rescue Mission Clinic provided an estimated \$1,935,243 in clinical services to our underserved and homeless communities in Miami, Hollywood and Pompano Beach.

The Miami Rescue Mission Clinic was founded in 2009 by Dr. Pete Gutierrez, a Miami Rescue Mission board member as a much-needed division of the Mission to provide medical services to their clients. Becoming independent in 2012 as a 501 (c) (3), it has continued to operate 3 clinics as an independent non-profit organization.

These services were accomplished from generous donations and support from many organizations and volunteers that have partnered with us in fulfilling our mission.

How our cash support was used

The almost **\$2** million in clinical services MRM Clinics provided in 2017 across our communities, was done with a staff in all three clinics which, as of December 31, 2017, comprised of 14 paid positions (8 full-time, 6 part-time), that enabled us to support our 12 volunteer providers and 114 support volunteers.

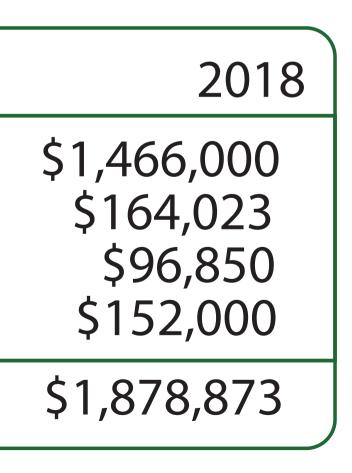
